




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April 2024 Bulletin: news & reminders

Our new year has got off to a busy start; scheduling lots of 'diabetic foot screening' open workshops - more about that below! As well as delivering a commissioned programme of workshops for Suffolk care providers.

If feels like the year is flying by at speed, with Easter already been and gone!

This bulletin is heavily focussed on the 'diabetic foot', but also has some other general information, including reminders about resources and Early Bird prices... as well as future plans!



Appropriate footcare for people living with diabetes is so important!

One of the regular healthcare checks for people living with diabetes is a 'diabetic foot screening' examination, regardless of whether they reside in their own home or in a care home.

We believe education, communication & collaboration are key to prevent/minimise diabetic foot problems.

Together we can make a difference; to reduce the number of diabetes related amputations taking place. In England alone:

- at least 1 amputation takes place every hour due to diabetic foot disease
- the cost of treating diabetic foot ulceration and amputation is higher than NHS expenditure on breast, prostate and lung cancer!

People with diabetes need to take particular care of their feet and check them daily. They should seek medical advice/care as soon as they notice any changes. They need to be assured that GPs, NHS footcare teams, private podiatrists and foot health practitioners are all available and not to delay in acting upon any foot related problems. What can appear to be a small problem can deteriorate very quickly.

The prevalence of diabetes & footcare outcomes

The National Diabetes Audit (NDA) and National Diabetes Footcare Audit (NDFA)

The number of people being diagnosed with type 2 diabetes is continuing to grow, as are the number of people at risk of developing diabetes.

Between 2017-18 and 2021-22, there was a steady year-on-year increase in the number of people with type 2 diabetes across all age groups, with a total percentage increase of 11.6% from 2017-18 to 2021-22. However, a steeper rise was observed in those under the age of 40 with a percentage increase of 18.7% between 2017-18 and 2021-2022 compared to 11.3% in those aged between 40 and 79 years old).

The NDFA Interval Review July 2014-March 2021 has found that the proportion of referrals seen by a specialist foot care team within 13 days has increased nationally, with a linked reduction in the proportion of ulcers that are severe at first expert assessment. However variations in 12-week outcomes still persist. There are gaps in service provision and "it is notable that almost 1 in 5 people (18%) presenting with a severe ulcer are dead (15%) or have undergone major amputation (3%) within 1 year". "There is still much work to do".

What have we been up to?

Following on from a successful diabetes training programme roll out for **Hallmark Care Homes** in 2022, we continue to work closely with them as an organisation. Last year we were commissioned by two Integrated care Boards in the East of England to deliver a wider diabetes training programme for healthcare professionals working in primary care who undertake diabetes reviews. Future plans... Diabetic foot awareness for beauty and wellness


For professionals working in the beauty and/or the holistic therapy industry, we are currently updating our online course which will be re-launched later this spring.

A new aspect of this training will be the ability for learners to book a place at a short live virtual classroom session after completing the online content. An opportunity to ask questions and consolidate learning; to further enhance knowledge and confidence.

Diabetic Foot Screening

These workshops offer the opportunity to build confidence, increase knowledge and obtain the tools/resources to help the people living with diabetes to reduce the risk of foot problems.

We discuss different foot problems encountered with people living with diabetes, what good daily footcare entails and we share some case studies.



The workshop is relevant for all practitioners working for social care or healthcare providers (whether in registered or non-registered roles), who are involved in examining the feet of people with diabetes.

The session provides the tools/processes that are used to undertake diabetic foot screening and result in a risk classification; the person performing the

examination is not required to make a clinical judgement.

For care homes...the NAPCHD guidelines state the use of 'a risk-calculation and assessment tool for diabetes foot disease' as being one of the elements of 'satisfactory diabetes care'. We often hear that this is a check that is missed when someone is in receipt of social care.

Open workshops

As well as providing this training as a commissioned service, we also continue to schedule open workshops.

Due to the popularity of this training, and in response to requests, we are travelling across the country to different venues. More are being planned, including Northern Ireland (near Belfast), Scotland (near Perth), South Wales (near Cardiff) to name a few.

Does your role involve caring for or treating people with diabetes, including checking their foot health?

Learn new (or refresh existing) skills! Ensure you are following current guidelines and best practice, including understanding the different risk classifications and associated actions to take and advice to give.

It's not just the theory! In an interactive and safe learning environment, you will be putting your new knowledge into practice. There is plenty of time for a practical 'hands on feet' session. And come armed with your questions – it is your training day and we want to ensure that the training relates to your setting and experiences so that you maintain, or even improve, your confidence!
